

Challenge 1

Setting up your shop.

When you have decided where to set up your shop, this could be indoors or even in the garden, you will need to find at least 10 items around the house to sell. You might decide to set up a supermarket, a toy shop, a garden centre etc. The choice is yours.

When you have decided on a name for your shop you will need to make a sign, try to do the sounding out and writing for your sign all by yourself! To make your shop look exciting you could make some paperchains or some posters of things you are selling to hang up.

Finally ask your grown up if they have any real coins and something to use as the till. This is a good opportunity to find out more about the different coins. Ask your grown-up to help you identify each of the coins.

If you don't have any loose change don't worry, you can easily make some by cutting and colouring circles of card or print them off the computer and cut them out.

Challenge 3

Now you are ready to open your shop.

Remember your customers are also very busy at home and won't be able to visit your shop all of the time. Below are some different ways you can use your shop on your own. Order the items in your shop from cheapest to most expensive.

Can you make the totals for each item using just 1p and 2p coins? E.g. if an item costs 5p instead of using the 5p coin can you use 5 x 1p. If an item costs 10p can you use 2 x 5p coins? This is tricky so don't worry if you can't manage this on your own.

Challenge 2

Opening times and pricing.

So your customers know when your shop will be open you will need to make a list of opening times thinking about the days of the week and times of the day. Don't forget the open and closed sign!

I love this paper plate clock with moving hands, this would look great in your shop!



Make a list of the items you are selling. Draw a picture of each one and label it. Try and write the words by yourself and use your phonics to help you. Now you need to decide how much each item will cost, so think carefully and add a price next to each item on the list.

Next, make price labels for the items in your shop, you could use sticky labels, post-it notes of small pieces of paper. Add them to your items. Don't forget to add the £ or p.

Independent Activities

Physical Development

Make a clock for your shop.

You will need:

Scissors

A paper plate

Felt pens

2 strips or card

A split pin



First add the 12 numbers to the paper plate - look at a clock to help you position them correctly.

Next make a hole in the centre of the plate using a pencil and blue tac (we have done this in school a number of times so your child should know this technique)

Then make a hole in the end of each strip of card and snip the end onto a point to make the hands on the clock.

Finally thread the split pin through the two hands and finally through the paper plate and secure in place.

Make paper chains to decorate your shop or house.

You will need:

Paper

Pens

Glue stick

Scissors



First Decorate and cut strips of paper/old magazines about ½ inch wide strips and long enough to make a loop.

Next put glue onto each end of the first strip and stick together making a circle shape or loop.

Then put the next strip through this circle and glue the ends together to form a second circle, repeat these steps until you have made a long chain.

Extra Maths Challenges: Money


Even in nursery money often features in **role play games**. Show your child some real coins and explain to them what the value of each one is. A good game for recognising coins is to put a pile of coins on the table and then give them five seconds to find a certain coin. You could also give them one of each of the different coins and ask them to put them in order, from smallest value to largest.

Once they are feeling a bit more confident with money, help them make the game real by letting them practise paying for items in small shops. Learning the value of each coin takes time, but handling real money will help them get a feel for what each coin looks like and what it's worth.

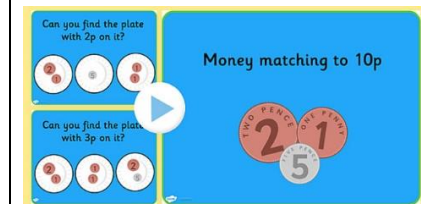
