I have broken the steps down into activities so please enjoy the process and I look forward to seeing your work.

Activity 1

Look at and talk about the features of different time machines from films for ideas. How about Dr Who's Tardis, the DeLorean from *Back to the Future*, Bill and Ted's phone booth or perhaps HG Wells' classic time machine?

Activity 2

Decide what kind of time machine you would like to build. This machine will be a vital component of your story. Think about your design; try different ideas. You can draw and label the finished design - or you can even make a model. If you want you can make a working model...

Activity 3

In your machine you can travel forwards or backwards in your life time. Where would you like to travel? Set your destination and describe why you have chosen this particular time period.

Activity 4

Investigate what your location would look like if you travelled into the past. What did Glossop look like 100 years ago? What about 1000 years ago? What about 100,000, 000?

What would Glossop look like in 100; 1000, 100,000,000 years in the future? Try to use evidence - ask people you know how Glossop has changed in their lifetimes. What would be the same? What would be different Why? Can you find any photographs of Glossop in the past?

Activity 5

Plan your story. If you can, discuss this with someone else. Use the planning sheet I have included to help you; it's like the ones we use in school. I have put it on a separate Word document so you can print it off or type directly onto it and save it.

You might want to think about how the present and the past and the future relate to each other. For example, I bet you have seen the films 'Back to the Future'. The lead character goes back into the past and changes things that have an effect on the future. How do events in the present affect the future? How do we create the future now? Why does what we do matter?
