Dear parents and carers of Peonies class,

I am delighted to be writing my first newsletter to you as your child's class teacher. I hope that you and your children have had a lovely summer and that you are all ready and raring to go for the new school year ahead! Let's hope that this will be a more settled year, with less disruption than schools have experienced in recent times.

Mrs Mettrick and I are looking forward to getting stuck in to life in Peonies class, and I would like to share with you some information that you may find useful, about the school year.



English and maths

As mentioned in my introductory letter that you saw at the end of the summer term, in our first week back, we will be studying a picture book unit to get us back in to learning, like we did when we returned to school after the most recent lockdown. We will do lots of English and PSHE work based around this book. For the rest of the term/school year, a lot of our English lessons will be topic themed, particularly our non-fiction units. We will begin our maths lessons in the first week of term, following the White Rose scheme. Over the course of the school year, children will be encouraged to log on to TT Rockstars to help them to learn their times tables or to keep working on their speed of recall of the tables. Further information will be provided about TT Rockstars in the first few days of term.

Topic

We will begin our first topic 'Maafa' in the second week back, beginning with a wow day on Monday 13th September. Accompanying this newsletter is a knowledge organiser about the topic, which you can read with your child, to find out what we are going to be learning about over the course of the term. Also accompanying the newsletter is a home learning guide, which contains some suggested activities that your child can do at home. Any work done can be returned to school on the last Monday of term so that we can look at it over the course of the week. On our wow day we will be learning about a significant figure from black history (William Wilberforce) and why he was so significant. We will be producing some art work as well as some written work. The children don't need to bring anything in to school on this day.



Other subjects

This year Peonies class are lucky enough to be taught by Mr Doyle on Monday and Thursday afternoons, which are my two afternoons out of class. He will be teaching them PE, RE and PSHE. I am sure the children will love their time with him! The language we are learning this year is German.

PE

As mentioned above, your child will need to come in to school in their PE kit on Monday and Thursday each week. Please could their kit be in line with our uniform policy, which is a plain white t-shirt or polo shirt, plain black shorts, plain black jogging bottoms and trainers. It may be a good idea for anyone with pierced ears to leave their earrings

out on PE days to save them having to take them out, or if your child struggles to remove their earrings, they can tape them over (tape will not be provided by school).

Homework

Homework will be given out on a Friday and will be due in on the following Thursday, when children will bring their homework books in to school for their work to be marked. Children will be provided with maths homework, spelling homework and they will also be expected to read at least five times a week, and for their reading to be recorded in their reading record. Homework will sometimes be set on SATs Companion, which is an online programme which offers maths and English support for Y6 children (your child will be provided with login details). We will increase our usage of this over the year as we head closer to the SATs window (May), to provide the children with support with their learning.

Reading

Your child will be provided with a reading book in line with their reading age, which will be given to them as early as possible in the first week of term. In class, children will have access to books off our reading shelves as well as library books (library won't be running as normal at first, but we will make sure library books are brought in to the classroom for the children to access) and we will also have our 50 Reads Challenge books in our reading treasure chest. These books are specific to Y6, and the children are encouraged to read as many, ideally all, of the books during their time in Y6. It is essential that those children who are free readers are reading books that are challenging enough for their age, and that they are accessing a wide range of genres and authors, and the 50 Reads Challenge is perfect for this! Further information about this challenge, as well as a book list, will be provided in the first few days of term.
